Writing	<p>Objective: Write in an organized way and convey tone (from the silly to the sublime); narrative writing</p> <p>Poetry: Circle poems, tone poems/awe poems, limericks</p> <p>Creative writing: Life in the Roman Empire (first person story), Dark Ages radio play, original fantasy story (tie in with <i>Edge of the Dark Sea...</i> book), feline story (tie in with science)</p> <p>Non-fiction writing: May edition school news, newspaper article covering an historical event, research paper on an animal; narrative writing prompts; family story (tie in with <i>Caddie Woodlawn</i>)</p>
